

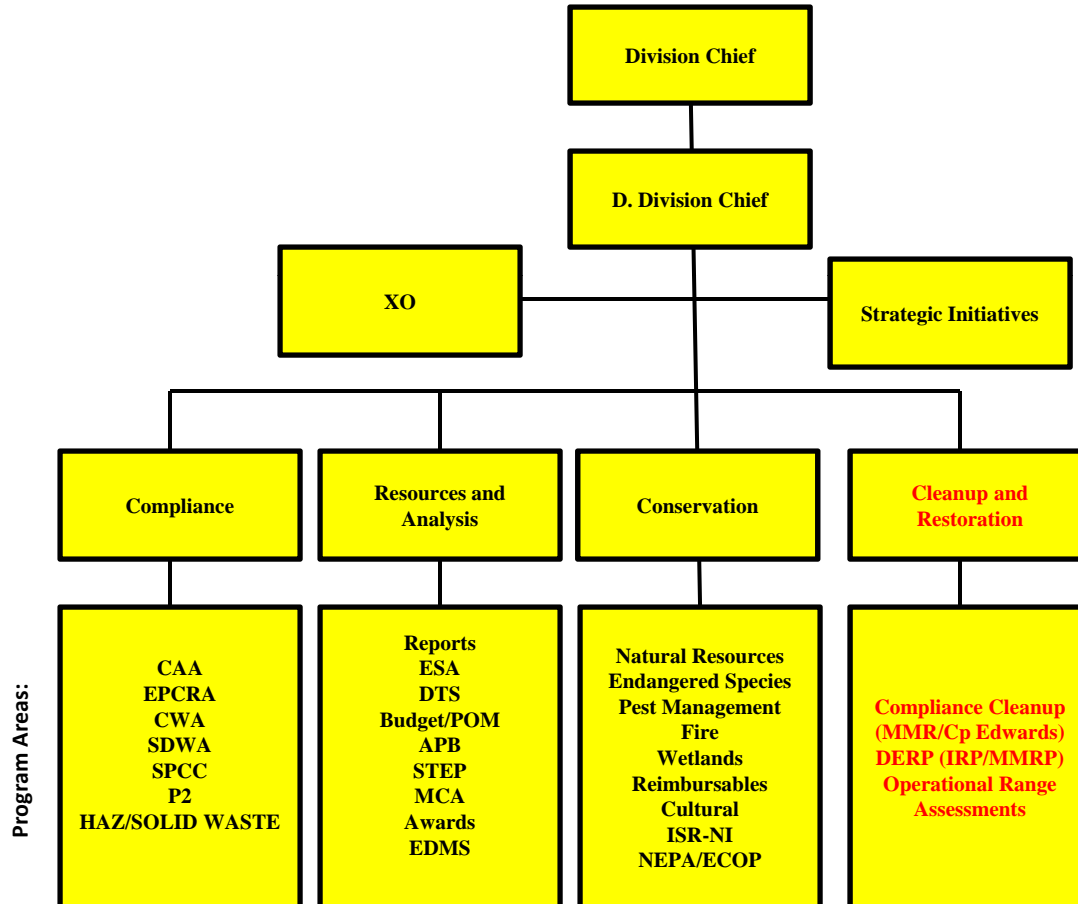

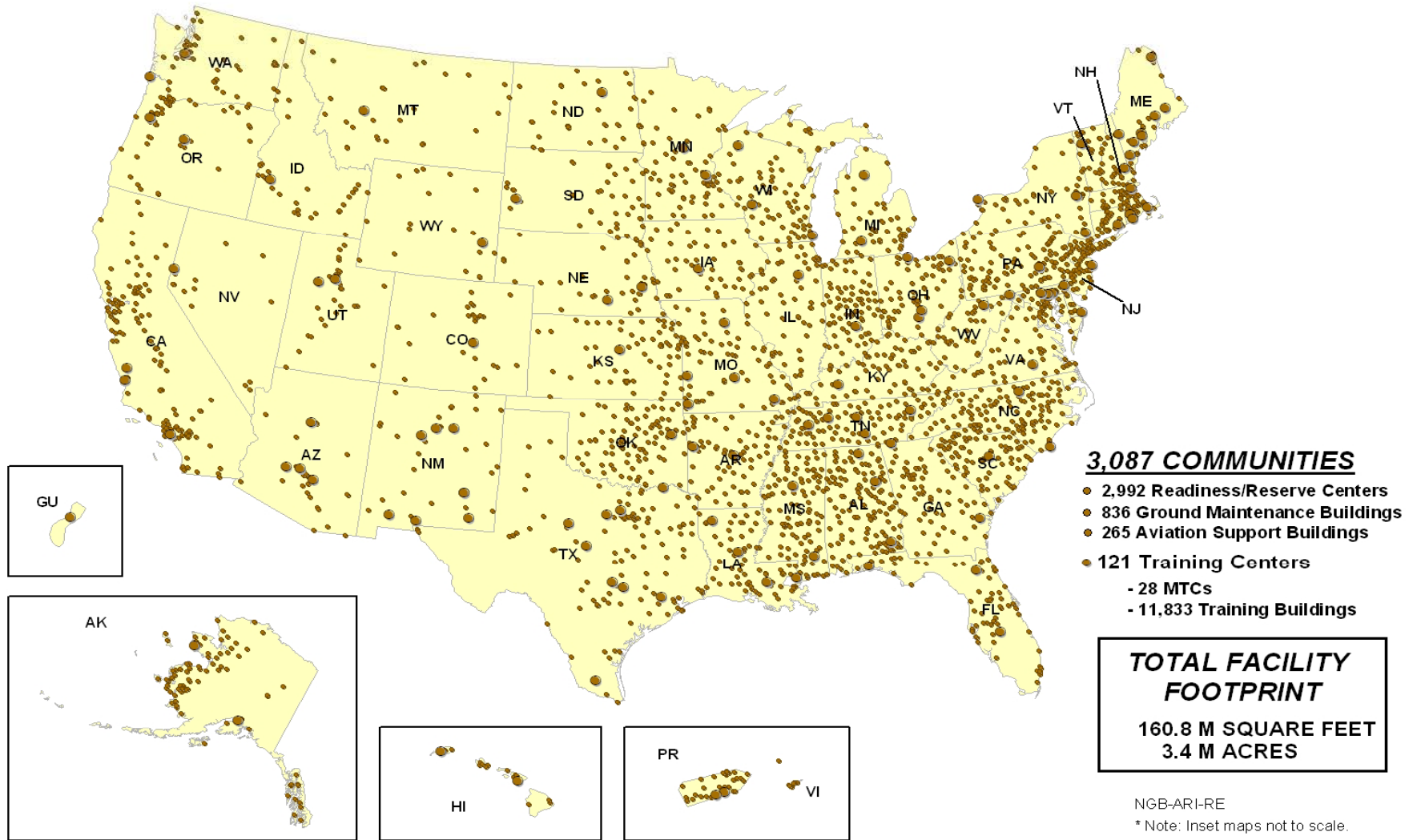

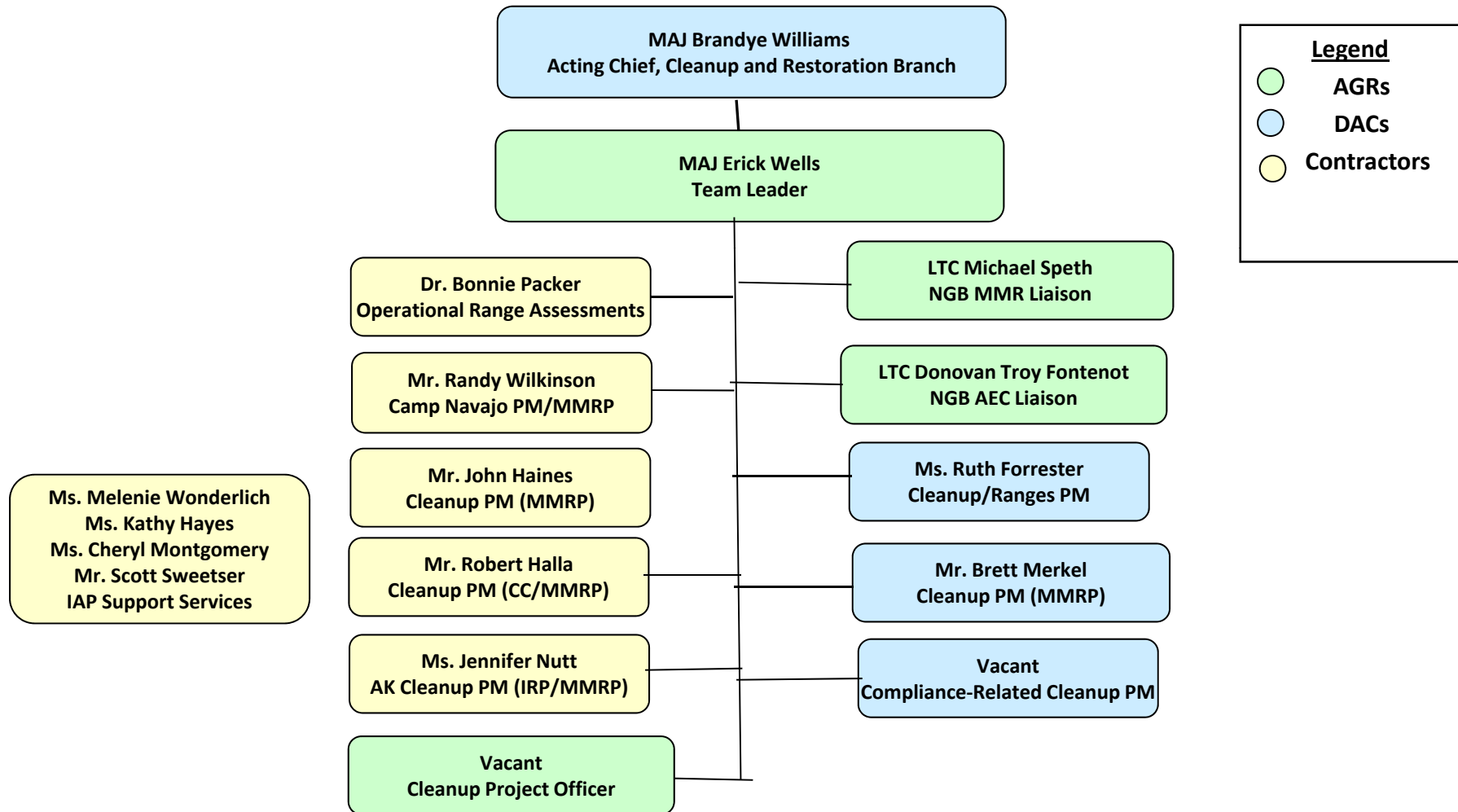


The ARNG Footprint

Vision

A world class Environmental organization leading the Department of Defense in Environmental Programs and Policy within a full spectrum environment

Mission

Acquire, manage and distribute environmental program resources; develop and administer environmental policies and programs; and serve as the “Channel of Communication” between the Army and the National Guard in 54 states and territories



Mission

Cleanup and Restoration Branch:

To lead and resource the Army National Guard's Cleanup and Restoration Programs to ensure protection of human health, restoration of the environment, and sustainable community relationships in support of ARNG Soldier training and readiness.



Major Programs

Operational Range Assessments (ORA):

- Part of the Army's Sustainable Range Program
 - Department of Defense Directive 4715.11 (10 May 2004)
 - "...Ensure the long-term viability of operational ranges while protecting human health and the environment."*
 - Department of Defense Instruction 4715.14 (30 Nov 2005)
 - "... Determining whether a release or substantial threat of a release of munitions constituents of concern from an operational range to an off-range area creates an unacceptable risk to human health or the environment."*
 - Phase I Assessments (Qualitative) results: 57 of 425 range complexes required Phase II Assessment
 - FY10-FY14 Phase II Assessments (Quantitative) execution
 - DoDD established 5 Year Periodic Review requirement for all complexes; execution effort to start in FY12
 - OSD work group still defining the future of ORA

✓ **Currently 5 sites referred for Remedial Investigation.**

✓ **Periodic reviews of Phase I Assessment sites starts in FY12. Future year funding programmed starting in FY15 under CC program.**



Major Programs

Defense Environmental Restoration Program (DERP):

- Purpose: To perform appropriate, cost-effective cleanup to protect human health and the environment for DERP eligible sites; funding provided under special Congressional appropriation (2020 funds).
 - FY14 ~\$54M obligated to ARNG project sites
 - NGB is the “channel of communication” between Army and ARNG per statute
 - MOA signed in FY10 with US Army Environmental Command resulted in ARNG-ILE central execution and management of ARNG projects
 - States fully engaged in decision-making processes
 - ✓ ARNG property ownership – ARNG future intended land use
 - ✓ Procurement strategies worked with State representatives
 - ✓ State contracts part of contracting toolbox
 - Majority of workload is in the Military Munitions Response Program
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Major Programs

Defense Environmental Restoration Program (DERP):

- Non-DoD (owned) Non-Operational Defense Sites (NDNODS) Inventory completed in Dec 2009. These are sites with potential historic munitions use within the public domain (property not owned by DoD).
 - SIs are completed: 11 sites currently under contract for FY14 RI/FS.
 - ✓ 116 NDNODS Inventory sites moving forward with RI/FS
 - ✓ 41 moving forward with 5 year reviews
 - ✓ MMRP eligible sites also included
 - 48 States and territories affected; **515** inventory defense sites
 - Currently, only SI efforts are approved for funding by OSD (for NDNODS Inventory sites). Actions beyond SI are not funded and will be funded using OMNG. MMRP eligible will continue on DERP path.
 - Sites are included in the Defense Environmental Program Annual Report to Congress
 - High regulatory interest due to nature of sites
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Major Programs

Compliance-related Cleanup (CC) Program:

- Purpose: To perform appropriate, cost-effective cleanup to protect human health and the environment, and to sustain operational readiness and training (2065 O&M funds).
 - FY14 programmed ~\$54M in 14 States with CC eligible projects
 - Funds distributed to States to execute
 - ✓ Mainly use State contracts to execute
 - ✓ Limited HQ oversight: ARNG complies upward reporting
 - ✓ NDNODS exception: Centrally Managed by Region
 - Camp Edwards/MMR included in CC Program
 - ✓ Transitioning MMR management and execution from US Army Environmental Command to ARNG Directorate/MANG
 - ✓ MMR has high regulatory engagement
 - ✓ MMR requires MILCON dollars for groundwater treatment systems
 - Ravenna included in both DERP and CC Programs
 - ✓ Ravenna has high regulatory engagement
 - ✓ Currently transitioning from BRAC to ARNG control
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ARNG Concerns

- Purpose: To perform appropriate, cost-effective cleanup to protect human health and the environment, and to sustain operational readiness and training (2065 O&M funds).
 - Funds distributed to States to execute program
 - ✓ Mainly use State contracts to execute
 - ✓ Limited HQ oversight
 - Camp Edwards/MMR included in CC Program
 - ✓ Transitioning MMR management and execution from US Army Environmental Command to ARNG Directorate/MANG
 - ✓ MMR has high regulatory engagement
 - ✓ MMR requires MILCON dollars for groundwater treatment systems; requires new add to FY17; however regulatory driven to accomplish within 18 mos of regulatory signature of Record of Decision.
 - ✓ Currently attempting to transfer AO's to FFA.
